Washington, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Forecast for Maine: Cloudy, probably rain on the east coast tonight; Friday fair, little change in temperature. Eastport to Sandy Hook: Gentle to moderate shifting winds becoming moderate northerly by tonight and overcast weather. Rain near Eastport tonight, Friday fair. Portland, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Weather forecast for Portland and vicinity: Fair tonight and Friday; rather cool; moderate north to east winds. A slight disturbance is near the New Jersey coast, and a large depression covers the entire West, while the hurricane is gradually approaching Bermuda. Pressure is high over Ontario and Carolinas. Scattered showers and thunderstorms occurred north of 30 latitude. It is rather cold east of Lake Superior and hot in the Southeast, fair weather will last until Sunday. Temperatures at 8 a. m.: Halifax 60; Eastport 54; Portland 57; Boston 62; New York 62; Hatteras 78; Miami 82; Greenville 50; Washington 65; Chicago 66; Portland, Ore., 60; Montreal 56.

Augusta, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Accident clinics, State Safety Director Walter J. Brennan said today, will be a part of the programme in connection with the ninth annual Maine Safety Conference Sept. 23 and 24 in the Eastland hotel, Portland. "Exhibits coming from as far west as Chicago, showing the latest in accident prevention equipment, will be shown at the conference," Brennan said. He said there would be a general and special session in which delegates from industrial firms over all the state would participate. The state police and several members of the Portland police department will give a demonstration in highway safety. Brennan said he was arranging to have several speakers from other states present at the conference.

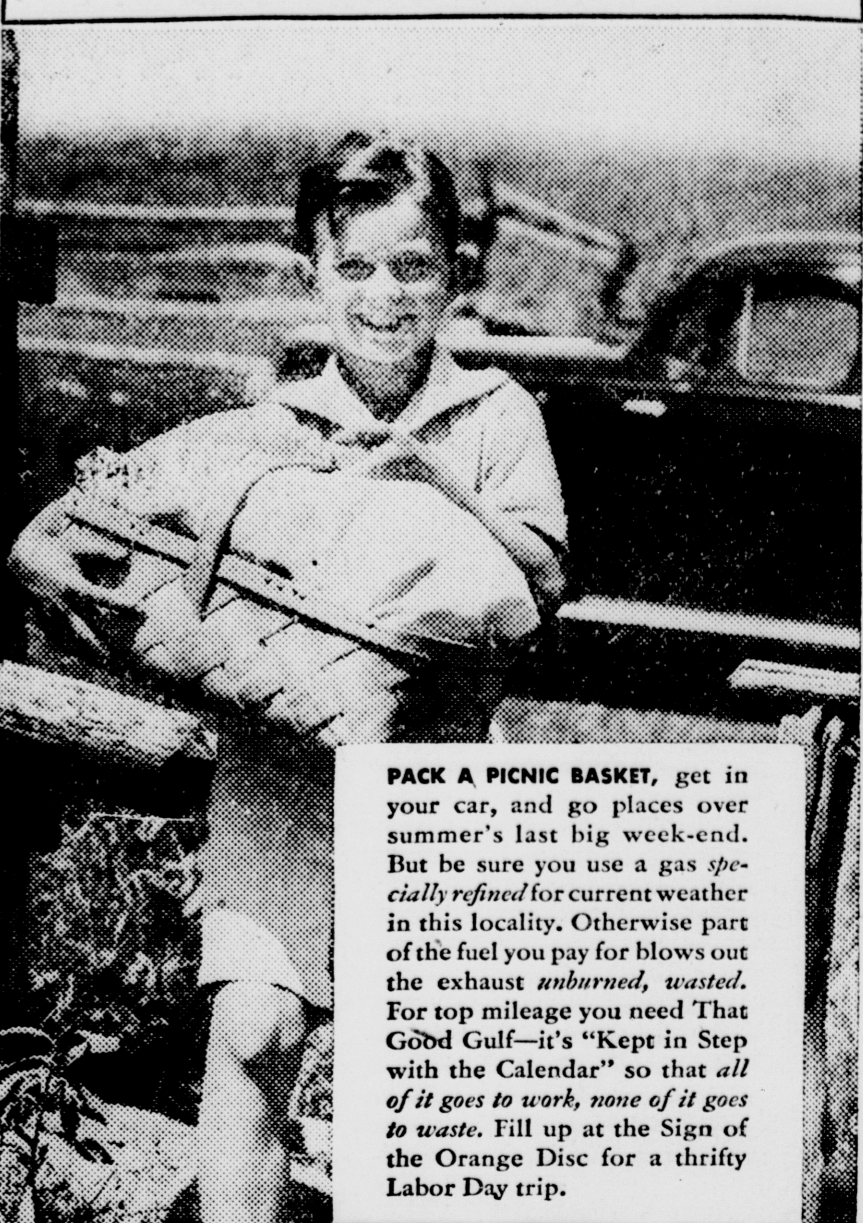

WAR VETERAN TAKES HIS LIFE BY HANGING

Ernest E. Hahnel, 49, a cigar-maker by trade, a veteran of the World War, was found hanging in the shed of his home, on the Ash Swamp road, in North Saco, early last evening by Samuel Scott, a neighbor, who had not seen anything of Hahnel since Sunday. He thought it strange that his neighbor had not been around the farm and decided to make an investigation. He was considerably shocked when he discovered the World War veteran hanging to a beam, in the small building, connected with the shed. A note was found close to the body, written on the back of an old photograph. The note read: "I did this myself by my own hand. Goodbye."

"Ernest E. Hahnel." According to information learned by the undertaker, Mr. Hahnel was born in Boston. His wife, Lucy A. Hahnel, resides in Portland, and he has a step-son and step-daughter in Portland. The Saco police were notified, and went to the Hahnel home. Dr. George Love of Saco, medical examiner of York county, was later notified by the officers and after he had made an investigation and decided that it was a case of suicide, Larry E. Shumway, funeral director, Saco, was notified, the body was taken to the funeral parlors, 35 Spring street and prepared for burial. The police were endeavoring today to get in touch with relatives of Hahnel in Massachusetts. Among the dead man's effects they found a life insurance policy, in which Fred Kyle, thought by City Marshal Harry Townsend to be a step-son, was named as a beneficiary. He was at the farm in North

member of St. Marys parish. She was attending the Spruce street school when the original church was being built. She was a charter member of the Assumption sodality of the parish, and for years was an active worker in the interests of the parish. She was a home-loving and a home-making mother who gave herself devotedly to her family. She had an unusual sense of humor and delighted in the company of young people, always finding a common interest with them. Her loyalty to her friends was manifested by her expressions of the pleasure she derived from the many messages of affection she received during the days of her inactivity. Mrs. Traynor enjoyed recalling the history of Biddeford and its people in the early days before the Civil war. She is survived by two sons, Capt. Joseph P. Traynor, U. S. N., retired, and George W. Traynor, who is connected with the internal revenue offices at Augusta; also two daughters, Mrs. Frank H. Kelly of Brighton, Mass., and Mrs. Martin T. Hall of Natick, Mass.; three grandchildren and two great grandchildren. The esteem in which she was held was indicated by the many messages of sympathy received during her last illness. She will be greatly missed, not only by members of the family, but among a large circle of friends in the city and vicinity. Arrangements for the funeral had not been completed today.
